Crigler Program for Student Success, named for Ursinus' first African American graduate in 1956, offers a four-credit course during the summer and one credit practicum in the fall of the first semester for first-year students in the program. In addition to the coursework, students are given the opportunity to participate in a community service project, connect with Ursinus alumni, and attend leadership workshops. This year, there are a total of 24 scholars and peer mentors, who will meet and participate in activities throughout their time at Ursinus.



Welcome Home Symposium



Guests from local museums, historical societies, educational institutions, and other organizations gathered on August 8 and 9 for the first annual Symposium for Indigenous Representation at Ursinus. The event was jointly organized by representatives from the Delaware Tribe of Indians and DICE. After opening remarks from President Hannigan, State Representative Joe Webster read a proclamation recognizing the importance of the event. The opening program was followed presentations and panel discussions. John Thomas (left) from the Delaware Tribe of Indians reflected on his personal papers which are now on loan to the college. Thomas was joined by Liam Reilly '24, who spoke about his work to categorize and organize Thomas's materials.

Participants also enjoyed a panel discussion featuring Jeremy Johnson, Cultural Education Director, Delaware Tribe of Indians, along with leaders from the Fort Pitt Museum, Museum of the American Revolution, and Pennsbury Manor.
